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Thursday Workshops

Pain and Symptom Management

Presented by Dr Ross Drake and Dr Freya Nicholas, this workshop will be a smorgasbord of symptom management in paediatric palliative care. Topics include feeding, constipation, dyspnoea and pain management, as well as an interactive question and answer session for all those questions that keep you up at night. This workshop is suitable for clinicians, both prescribers and non-prescribers, who are interested to learn more.

Culture and Diversity: Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Perspectives

This workshop is facilitated by Yody Espitia Buritica (Clinical Nurse Facilitator at Hummingbird House) and Taki Langlasse (Family and Community Support Practitioner at Hummingbird House). The facilitators will be speaking from their hearts on how we can all work together to walk alongside CALD families with humility and compassion so that we all can continue to improve the outcomes for all children and families facing life-limiting conditions, death, dying, and grief, regardless of their cultural, religious, educational or socio-economic backgrounds.

This workshop is not about knowing the number of the interpreter and translator services, but rather an opportunity to have honest conversations about our own personal and cultural values and how we meet with families when those values are challenged.

Culture and Diversity: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Perspectives

This Yarning Circle will be hosted by Brooke Kaden and Yasmin Johnson, Aboriginal Health Worker/s and First Nations Project Officers from the Paediatric Palliative Care Service, Children's Health Queensland (QCH), based in Brisbane. Brooke will present on the topic of Culture and Diversity sharing the First Nation's perspectives on what this means for them.

Karen Joy, Clinical Nurse, PPCS (Brisbane) will share some case studies for further discussion and exploration of themes that have emerged from care experiences.

The Yarning circle, support by Yasmin Johnson will explore themes that emerge and together we will discover and understand how the past can affect the present, the diversity that exists within communities and barriers and challenges that exist in delivering culturally appropriate and safe care and how we can bring about improvements.

This workshop is suitable for clinicians, non-clinicians and advocates for the provision of quality care for First Nation's paediatric patients and families.

Grief and Bereavement

Alyson Gundry, Allied Health Clinical Lead – Paediatric Palliative Care Service and Allied Health Clinical Educator for Quality of Care Collaborative Australia (QuoCCA) and Dr Leigh Donovan, Peer Mentor Program Manager with Ladybird Care Foundation and Consultant in Thanatology (Collaboraide) will be co-facilitating workshops alongside parents who have become *changemakers* as a result of their child's diagnosis with a life limiting condition and/or the death of their child.

Australia is privileged to be able to extend extraordinary care to young people with life limiting conditions and their families through paediatric palliative care and hospice services. However, parents and carers continue to remind us that more can be done.

Six bereaved parents will join us across the Summit's two workshops, as we collectively have conversations about their experiences, delve into what motivated them to become activated, and how they became changemakers to improve future care for parents/ carers. These parents will share what they observed within health and social care professionals that supported their drive to become changemakers.

We envisage this to be an interactive learning circle between parents, health and social care professionals and hold firm that the greatest learning emerges when all can come together for honest and courageous conversations.

Perinatal Palliative Care

Join Deb Gilmour (Neonatologist), Kelly Oldham (Nurse Practitioner, Hummingbird House), Shannon Shorthouse (Midwife, Mater Mothers Hospital) and Holly Foggin (Nurse Educator, Hummingbird House) in a multi-professional workshop focussed on perinatal palliative care. This workshop will utilise small group work and interactive sessions focussed on a clinical case to explore parallel planning, individualised care planning, and ethical issues which arise during pregnancy and newborn care where there is a suspected life-limiting or life-threatening condition. This workshop is suitable for clinicians and advocates from any background, and encompassing the spectrum from those with no experience but a curiosity to know more, through to those with practical or lived experience in perinatal palliative care.

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Speaker Profiles

Rachel Callander

Rachel's work combines her perspective as an artist, her experience being mum to her late daughter Evie who was born with a rare condition, and hundreds of hours in consultation with both healthcare professionals, educators, and caregivers the world over.

Rachel imparts actionable strategies for effective communication and transformation in the healthcare, education, and disability sectors, for the benefit of all. She believes in human centred-care and that the system should be responsible for the wellbeing of everyone involved.

Rachel is a speaker, trainer, award winning author and artist, and patient advocate.

Joan Marston

Joan has a background in nursing and social science, and has worked in palliative care since 1989 at local, national and international level, specialising in paediatric palliative care. The AIDS pandemic led to her setting up Sunflower Children's Hospice in Bloemfontein in 1998; then leading the development of the South African national children's palliative care programme. These led to her coestablishing and leading the International Children's Palliative Care Network (ICPCN) for the first 12 years.

She remains an ICPCN Global Ambassador. Co-founding PallCHASE- Palliative Care in Humanitarian Aid Situations and Crises in 2016 she is on the executive committee responsible for advocacy and children; and with special interest in Ukraine. As the Vice-President of the Elisabeth Kubler-Ross Foundation Global she co-leads an EKRF Fellowship in South Asia.

Joan remains active in paediatric palliative care education across a number of countries.

Helen Irving

Helen is an Associate Professor, University of Queensland, Pre-Eminent Specialist and the Clinical Lead – Centre Children's Health Ethics and Law at Children's Health Queensland Hospital and Health Services, and Co- Chair of the Queensland Paediatric palliative Care Haematology Oncology sub-Network (QPPHON).

She is recognised nationally and internationally for her contribution to, and development across many aspects of clinical care and research in the areas of oncology, paediatric palliative and supportive care, telemedicine, and medical ethics (Bioethics). Helen was instrumental in the development of the state-wide paediatric palliative care service, initially with a 24 hour on-call telephone support service for patients and families and for clinicians providing care across the Queensland and northern NSW. This vision and recognition of collaborative partnering, and enduring advocacy, has led to the formalised and holistic state-wide paediatric palliative care service.

Friday Program Option 1: Communication Workshop by Rachel Callander

BELOW THE SURFACE: Strategies to forge connection through awareness of language, communication, behaviour and values.

This thought-provoking workshop explores the relationships between our surface words and actions and the deeper drivers of emotion, values and beliefs.

As we understand what drives the behaviours of others, we develop a greater level of compassion for them. Below the Surface advocates for humanity, not hierarchy.

It encourages respect, grace, and an intent towards collaboration, instead of confrontation. This is the space of psychological safety and where shared decisions can be made with trust and clarity. Workshop attendees are left with a sense of hope, validation, and empowerment as they head out into their work, and their lives.

They are better equipped to more effectively communicate, share difficult information, and have more confidence in dealing with confronting emotions and behaviours.
